Exercise Oncology

Physical activity is vital for maintaining strength and energy levels during cancer treatment. The exercise oncology program is quickly becoming the flagship program, with many more individuals taking part in the program this past year.

Clinical Psychology and Social Work Satisfaction Survey

Demand for clinical psychology and social work services remained strong, throughout the past financial year.

Under a process of continuous improvement, the Wellness Centre issued other annual Satisfaction Survey and were thrilled to learn that client satisfaction has reached exceptional high levels!

Survey respondents' rate their satisfaction between 8 and 32, with 8 being low and 32 being the highest score.

We are thrilled to announce that overall satisfaction was 30.7!!!

*The Trust Fund together with other funding sources enable the Wellness Centre Social Work Services.

Pillar 2 - Research

We invested **\$113,720** with the Border Medical Research unit to fund a Clinical Research Nurse 4 days a week. Participation in clinical trials gives cancer patients the opportunity to play a more active role in their own health care with research staff providing medical care and more frequent health check-ups.

We invested **\$167,659.50** to improve cancer treatment

and outcomes.

Highlights



Over the past year, we celebrated many highlights, including successful community led fundraising events, expanded support programs in the Wellness Centre, and new research initiatives that have strengthened our vision, and empowered those affected by cancer.

For us at the Trust Fund however, none of this is possible without our community. Your generosity and support enable us to steadily work towards what we set out to do in 2014 when the Trust Fund was established.

Community events and fundraising efforts represent many thousands of dollars in volunteer hours demonstrating the incredible spirit of community that makes our work possible.

Every single donation, no matter the size makes a difference.



Cans for Cancer

Howlong's Wayne Lamb has donated many volunteer hours to collect cans to raise money for the Albury Wodonga Regional Cancer Centre Trust Fund, an activity he has not stopped undertaking since 2019. Mr Lamb is motivated to fundraise for the Trust Fund after supporting several family members through cancer, including his wife, Lisa.

Based on the Cost of Volunteering Calculator established by NSW peak volunteering body, Centre for Volunteering, volunteers are now worth \$43.27 per hour. We can only imagine the number of hours Wayne has donated to the Trust Fund. We would estimate that on average, Wayne donated four hours a week over the past financial year, equating to \$9,000.16 in volunteer hours.

We are most grateful Mr Lamb has this year donated \$9,529.30 to the Trust Fund and to all those volunteer hours that keep us moving forward.

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Sunshine Walk

The 2023 Sunshine Walk was dedicated to John Watson, a former board member and event Ambassador who lost his battle with pancreatic cancer in August that year. John's sons, George, Digby and Dugald, and their partners, helped lead out the walks from the Albury Sportsground and expressed their pride in representing both their parents on one of John's most important days of the year.



More than 800 individuals and 64 Teams dressed in yellow and walked 5,10 or 20km on November 12, raising a total of \$160,534 for the Trust Fund. As part of the DIY option, teams and individuals also walked in regional towns including Corowa, Myrtleford, and Walbundrie, as well as interstate in Queensland, Tasmania, and Western Australia.

There were plenty of costumes, with many choosing to add an extra splash of colour to their Sunshine Walk clothing. What was apparent were the smiles on everyone's faces as they walked in support of family, loved ones, colleagues and fellow community members.

This sense of community draws people to the Sunshine Walk. Wodonga couple Phil and Julie Wilkins together with their team, Phil's Followers, expressed gratitude to the Trust Fund and Cancer Centre. They were walking to support Phil's fight against mesothelioma before he sadly died in February 2024. Both Phil and Julie have been among our community's strongest advocates for the treatment and services offered at the Cancer Centre. We thank those who walked, donated, supported, sponsored or volunteered their time on the day. Without you, this event would not be possible.

We are delighted to advise that our survey results found that you rated the event as 4.8 out 5 stars, and 100% of you intend to walk again in 2024.

Holbrook Football Netball Club led by Andrew Mackinlay

The Holbrook Football and Netball Club fundraiser raised an impressive \$58,525 for the Trust Fund. Organiser and Brookers co-coach Andrew Mackinlay had initially aimed to raise \$10,000. That goal that was guickly adjusted to \$20,000, and to everyone's surprise, the final amount continued to rise as the Holbrook and district community got behind Andrew's initiative. Eighty-five specially designed jumpers were auctioned and all gate takings from Game Day on Saturday, June 1 were donated to the Trust Fund.



Lake Hume Cycle Challenge

The 2023 Lake Hume Cycle Challenge raised an incredible \$28,340 for the Wellness Centre within the Albury Wodonga Regional Cancer Centre. The Rotary Clubs of Bellbridge Lake Hume and Albury North were absolutely thrilled to announce they had increased their total by \$8,000 on the previous year. Organisers attributed the outstanding result to the new 114km Lake Hume Hustle, which attracted 90 riders.

As the major beneficiary of the ride since 2013, more than \$200,000 has been raised to support the operation of the Wellness Centre within the Albury Wodonga Regional Cancer Centre. This commitment to the Wellness Centre ensures our community members can benefit from the range of wellness and support programs that are open to not only patients, but their loved ones and carers as well.

Andrew's fundraising idea began with a casual conversation with our Trust Fund Manager, Tom O'Connor. This initiative highlighted the community's dedication to supporting the Cancer Centre, and he admitted feeling somewhat overwhelmed by the generosity and scale of the donations received.

Andrew is one of many in our community who have an idea and are driven to support the Trust Fund's work. We cannot possibly list all fundraising individuals and groups in this report, but note with gratitude that all fundraising efforts are celebrated.

There would be hundreds of volunteer hours associated with this annual event and we would like to express our heartfelt thanks to all volunteers, sponsors, and the organising committee for their ongoing support. It is your trust in us, that keeps us focused on our mission.



Cofield Wines

Damien and Melanie Cofield and Bronwyn Tyrrell continue to support the Trust Fund on an annual basis through their Pink Pedal Party and their annual limited-edition wine. For the Cofield family fundraising efforts are deeply personal and were established to honour the winery founder Max Cofield's wife, Karen, who died from cancer in 2017.

This year sales of the limited-edition Dove Rose and Pink Pedal Party raised \$42,555 for the Trust Fund. We are grateful for Cofield's ongoing commitment to assisting us to make a difference in the lives of those who have found themselves in the position of needing cancer services.



Sunshine Ride

We had 142,000 reasons to smile this March! A staggering \$142,000 worth of smiles as the Sunshine Ride Committee released its final fundraising tally. This represented an increase of \$29.000 on the 2023 Ride.

Organisers Steven Ballard, Ashley Ballard and Committee work tirelessly to ensure the event is successful. This year's event saw almost 300 riders taking part in the 24-hour bike challenge. with the goal to raise money and awareness for the Albury Wodonga Regional Cancer Centre Trust Fund.

According to Steve Ballard, the success of the Sunshine Ride is due to the hard-working committee who manage to fit in the event as well as running their lives. They have a passion for fun. And if a problem arises, they know it will all work out on the day.

This event is an increasingly important one on the Trust Fund Calendar, one that is filled with optimism and a strong sense of teamwork that enables the Trust Fund to continue to support cancer services in our region. We are incredibly proud to partner with Steven and Ashley and their hardworking Sunshine Ride Committee and thank them for the thousands of volunteer hours they dedicate to ensuring we continue to support those in our community impacted by cancer.
